



## 2018 Guide towards court certification for Spanish Speaking Interpreters:

**Second**, you have until May 7th, to enroll for the next orientation taking place in Orlando on June 18th-19th. The cost is \$150.00 for a Florida resident or \$300.00 if you are not. To register print the following form and mail it to the following address:

**Third**, after you have finally attended the orientation, then you can register for the English Written Exam. You can take this test online, so I recommend you register the moment you get home from the orientation.

**Sixth**, register to take the Oral Exam.
